Glossary of Terms

Approved Sponsor An organisation approved by Immigration New Zealand to manage the direct sponsorship of refugees in the local community.

CAB Citizens Advice Bureau

Community member An individual, New Zealand resident

Community group Any group of individuals, family | whānau or friends who come together to partner with Approved Sponsors and support refugees settling in their community.

Community Organisation Refugee Sponsorship (CORS) category Name of visa category

CORS Community Organisation Refugee Sponsorship programme
Referred to as Community Refugee Sponsorship programme, Community Sponsorship programme or Refugee Sponsorship programme.

Deed of Agreement for Services (DOA) The legal agreement that specifies the outcomes agreed on that the Approved Sponsor and Immigration New Zealand sign when they take on the role of the Approved Sponsor in the Refugee Sponsorship programme.

Former refugee community

Individuals or informal network of people that have the common experience of being displaced from their home, who came to Aotearoa as refugees or asylum seekers and have already resettled in New Zealand. Former refugees play a key role in helping sponsored refugees settle in their new communities and have also been integral in shaping the extended pilot.

SOC Summary of Claim

Sponsored refugee A refugee who has arrived in New Zealand and is currently part of the CORS/Community Refugee Sponsorship programme.

manaakitanga Hospitality, kindness, generosity, support - the process of showing respect, generosity and care for others

te whare tapa whā The house with four walls - concept of 'te whare tapa whā' as model of health: the four cornerstones of Māori health.

tino rangatiratanga Self-agency

tūrangawaewae Sense of belonging

wairua Spirit, soul - spirit of a person which exists beyond death

whānau Extended family or family group

whanaungatanga Nurturing of mutually respectful and collaborative relationships between all parties

whakawhanaungatanga Process of establishing relationships, relating well to others
